

10 Real-Life 'Twin Peaks' Locations You Can Visit Today

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Fans of David Lynch's ABC series *Twin Peaks* have a third season to look forward to in 2016: Lynch is writing, directing, and producing a new season of the Washington-set cult classic, to air on Showtime Networks. Catch up on the original series with this guide to some of the must-see, real-life filming locations (including where to get a damn fine cup of coffee).



Great Northern Hotel: Snoqualmie, WA

One of the show's most recognizable locations is the Great Northern Hotel, which served as the home base for FBI agent Dale Cooper (Kyle MacLachlan). The exterior of the hotel that appears in the opening credits is actually of the [Salish Lodge and Spa](#), where rooms run anywhere from \$175-\$300.



Snoqualmie Falls: Snoqualmie, WA

Just to the right of the Salish Lodge and Spa is the 270-foot-tall [Snoqualmie Falls](#), which memorably appears in the show's opening credits. It's a popular tourist attraction—even with visitors who have no *Twin Peaks* affiliation—and you can view the falls from an observation deck or two-acre park. (There's free parking from dawn until dusk.)
